### A few things to think about

You do not have to go to grad school

• Make sure you are going for the right reasons

Applying requires time and effort (and money)

• Months of emails, essays, and forms

Being in grad school requires time and effort (and money)

• Years of reading, writing, courses, tests, lab work...

There will be rejection, and that's okay

- Many different reasons
- Special mention: clinical programs

# Applying to grad school

### The basics

- Supervisor
- Transcripts
- Reference letters (2-3)
- CV
- Statement of interest
- Funding
- Graduate Record Exam (GRE)

Each program has different requirements, read instructions!

### Getting a supervisor

- Do your research interests align?
- Are your working styles compatible?
- Are they well funded?
- Can they help you get funding?

### Contacting a supervisor

- Do it early, around August
- Establish a link between your experience and interests, and their work
- Do your homework and show it
  - Read their papers
  - Go through their website
- Are they looking for grad students?
- Do they supervise research or clinical students?

### Asking for letter of reference

#### Who?

- Thesis supervisor
- You were a <u>good</u> volunteer, RA or TA for them
- Profs that know you well

#### When?

- Before you apply
- 3-4 weeks in advance

### How?

- Remind them who you are
- Give them the information they need
  - CV
  - Where you are applying
  - Deadlines

### Statement of purpose

- Letter of intent, personal statement...
- Explain why you want to be in that particular program
- Sell yourself: why are you a good candidate?
- The ultimate goal: what will you do with the degree?
- <u>Read instructions!</u>
  - Include specific information
  - Length

### Funding



### Money can come from different places

- Graduate stipend
- Internal awards and scholarships
- External funding
  - Federal
  - Provincial

### Graduate stipend

- Programs might guarantee a minimum salary
  - Find out if and how much
  - Concordia: \$21,000/year
- Supervisors might have grants to pay you from
- Top off with TA and RA work
  - Be mindful of the workload

### Internal awards and scholarships

- Depends on the university, department, program...
- Automatic consideration upon application
  - You don't have to do anything else!
- Supplemental application
- They can be a good source of extra money and good for your CV

### The basics

- Transcripts
- CV –ish
  - Tri-Agency: Canadian Common CV (<u>CCV</u>)
  - FRQ will ask for education, experience, and awards in the form
- Research proposal

Each agency has different requirements, read instructions!

### Choosing the right agency

- Think of your research proposal
- Check supervisor's funding
- Look at projects that the agency funds
- Federal: any program in Canada
- Provincial: can be taken outside Quebec

### Federal funding

Eligibility:

Canadian citizens, permanent residents of Canada, or Protected
Persons

#### Master's programs:

- \$17,500/year for one year
- December 1<sup>st</sup>

### Federal funding

Doctoral programs:

- Value of award varies
- <u>CIHR</u> October 13<sup>th</sup>
- <u>NSERC</u> October 17<sup>th</sup>
- <u>SSHRC</u> October 17<sup>th</sup>

### **Provincial funding**

Eligibility:

- Canadian citizens or permanent residents and have RAMQ
- Proof of admission to program or acceptance from supervisor Master's programs:
- \$20,000/year up to 2 years
- FRQNT October 3<sup>rd</sup>
- FRQS October 5<sup>th</sup>
- FRQSC October 4<sup>th</sup>

### **Provincial funding**

Doctoral programs:

- \$25,000/year up to 4 years
- FRQNT October 3<sup>rd</sup>
- FRQS October 5<sup>th</sup>
- FRQSC October 4<sup>th</sup>

### Final tips

- There is not just one right path
  - It's okay to go to grad school, or not
  - It's okay to go right after graduation, or not
- Do it for the right reasons
  - Being called "Dr." is nice, but not enough
- You will survive being rejected
- Be mindful of time
  - Start early
  - Applying will take a lot of time
- Grad school is an investment
  - Put your time, effort, and money in the right place
